



# PRESS RELEASE PRESENTATION OF « MARSAD.TN», LAUNCHING OF ITS NEW ONLINE PLATFORM

Transparency and vitality of democratic debate Questions-Answers with elected representatives

## **CONTEXT: DRAFTING OF THE NEW TUNISIAN CONSTITUTION**

The election of the constituent assembly was held on 23 October 2011 following the revolution, and marked the beginning of the Tunisian democratic transition. This democratization process represents a huge challenge for elected representatives, civil society and citizens.

However, the writing of the new constitution is not participative and many citizens are kept away from the drafting process. The website « Marsad.tn » and its new platform were set up with the aim of fostering transparency and citizen participation.

The current situation is characterized by several uncertainties. It seems difficult to meet the deadline initially set on 23 October for ratifying the new constitution. Immediately after the end of the parliamentary holidays in September, the coordination committee will hold a meeting in order to update the Constituent Assembly's calendar and present the final draft of the constitution in the following days.

« Marsad.tn » has one main objective: acting as an efficient promoter of transparency and democratic debate throughout this process.

constituency, political stances etc.

Assembly (vote tracking system).

Free access to all documents, briefs, minutes issued by constituent, legislative, special and

joint committees. 170 documents have been already published on the website Marsad.tn

The rough draft of the new constitution translated from Arabic to French.

LAUNCHING OF THE SECOND VERSION OF MARSAD.TN: REINFORCING TRANSPARENCY

AND VITALITY OF THE DEMOCRATIC DEBATE

The second version of Marsad.tn that will be launched in October 2012 is set up as a new platform of

questions-answers allowing citizens to ask questions and participate to a democratic dialogue with

their elected representatives:

The citizen will be able to question publicly his elected representatives about his matters

of concern; participate to democratic debate; and take decisions on the basis of reliable

information.

The elected representative will be able to set out his points of view; explain/justify his

votes; communicate about his activities; and show his ability to listen to and dialogue with

citizens about their problems and preoccupations.

> For the mass media, it will make available to them an important database on elected

representatives, their communication with citizens, and represent a potential source for

articles, interviews and analysis.

HOW DOES THE NEW ONLINE PLATFORM WORK?

Each citizen will be able to identify his elected representatives; to access to information about their

activities; and to ask them one or several questions.

All questions and answers will be validated by a member of the moderation team of Marsad.tn before

its publication on the online platform. The moderation team, which works on the basis of strict rules of

moderation, will make sure that all debates are lawful, respectful and comprehensible.

PARTNERSHIPS WITH PARLIAMENT WATCH AND MICT

Al Bawsala has signed a partnership with the German organization Parliament Watch

(http://www.abgeordnetenwatch.de) for the development of the new online platform of Marsad.tn.

The project Parliament Watch was launched in Germany in 2004 on Gregor Hackmack and Boris

Hekele's initiative, awarded in 2008 by the Association Ashoka, in 2010 by the "Fairness Initiative

Award" and in 2011 by the "German Prize for Civic Engagement". The German platform, that

received 3 million of visits in 2011, currently covers the elected representatives of the two chambers of

the federal parliament of Germany (Bundestag and Bundesrat), 8 state parliaments and 20 municipal

councils.

«Marsad.tn » is a project financed by « Media In Corporation and Transition » (MICT), a German

organization supported by the German ministry of foreign affairs.

## MARSAD'S ADVISORY BOARD

The project Marsad.tn is chaperoned by an Advisory Board made up of distinguished, honorable and unbiased personalities that do not have any political affiliation.

The Board's members are regularly consulted to determine whether or not the questions asked online comply with the code of moderation in case of disagreement between the moderators of Marsad.tn.

The Board consists of the following members:

- ➤ Pr. Salsabil Klibi: Born on 5th June 1964, Pr. Salsabil Klibi completed a master in public law at the Faculty of Law and Political Sciences of Tunis. She currently teaches constitutional law and philosophy of law at the faculty of Juridical, Political and Social Sciences of Tunis. Professor Klibi is also a member of the Tunisian Association of Constitutional Law; the Association of research on democracy and development (AR2D) and she is the executive secretary of the International Academy of Constitutional Law.
- ➤ Sami Ben Gharbia: Born in Bizerte in 1967, Sami Ben Gharbia campaigned against censorship and repression and fled from Tunisia in 1998 to the Netherlands as political refugee. He couldn't return home in Tunisia before the 2011 revolution. He published the first Tunisian e-book Borj Erroumi XL that tells the story of the escapade that he was forced to, crossing Africa and the Middle East, to reach Europe and get asylum. He was the Director of Global Voices Advocacy and co-founded the independent website Nawaat.org. He was listed in 2011 as one of Foreign Policy's Top 100 Global Thinkers.
- Lotfi Saibi: Born in 1960 in Jelma, Gouvernorate of Sidi Bouzid, Lotfi Saibi studied at the Faculty of Sciences of Tunis, where he got involved in the UGET at the age of 17. Lotfi was arrested twice, in January 1978 and March 1979 by the police for "inciting" public disorder. The physical and emotional scars he suffered propelled him to leave for the U.S where he got a Master's Degree in Management and Leadership from Harvard University. Mr. Saibi has been involved in executive leadership of many organizations, as well as lectures about his favorite subjects: leadership and effective communications using new technologies. He returned permanently to his native country after the 2011 revolution and he is now involved in several projects and initiatives.
